The name 'Bibbulmun' represents 1 of the 14 clans of the Noongar Nation of the southwest of Western Australia and the Bibbulmun peoples' dialect belongs to the oldest linguistic clan.

Although founded in WA, the Bibbulmun Fund has extended its reach to the broader Aboriginal community across Australia.

The Bibbulmun Fund is held in trust by the Fremantle Foundation (ABN: 23 992 104 836), a community foundation that supports and administers family, individual and corporate giving.











The Bibbulmun Fund aims to open new possibilities for Aboriginal enterprise and foster entrepreneurial leadership by supporting Aboriginal-owned and delivered projects which focus on real outcomes and collaborative approaches toward economic development.

It is led by an advisory board who approve support for regionally relevant initiatives that facilitate positive impact throughout Aboriginal Australia.

A Balladong-Whadjuk man of the Noongar Nation, and a leader in the Aboriginal business community, Kim is a highly respected and influential member of the Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal community.

With experience as the former CEO, and current Executive Chairman, of Australia's largest Aboriginal-owned business and office supply company Kulbardi, and the current Executive Chairman of Kooya, Kim is also the Director of his own education and training consultancy firm Kooya Consultancy.

A compassionate leader with warmth and humility, Kim's most rewarding role is the Chairperson of the Bibbulmun Fund, a not for profit arm designed to 'give back' to the Aboriginal community right across Australia.

Besides his children, the Bibbulmun Fund is his proudest achievement. With commitment and devotion, he is deeply motivated to chair the Advisory Board towards facilitating positive change 'by Aboriginal people, for Aboriginal people'.







### Sharna Collard, Chief Executive Officer, Kooya

Sharna Collard is a Balladong-Whadjuk woman of the Noongar Nation and the CEO of Kooya. Kooya is Australia's first and largest Aboriginal-owned Fleet, Finance and Salary Packaging Company. Kooya provides bespoke leasing, rental, fleet management and salary packaging products across Australia for all types of environments.

Sharna has worked comprehensively in the Aboriginal business Sector and is a director of the Noongar Chamber of Commerce and Industry (NCCI). Sharna has a strong passion for working with Aboriginal women and broader Aboriginal people/communities who have the desire to establish their own business.

Sharna has won two awards at the Supply Nation Supplier Diversity awards as Young Indigenous Entrepreneur of the Year 2018 and Indigenous Businesswoman of the Year 2019.

### **COMMUNITY HEALTH PROJECTS**

Innovative health projects that have long-term sustainability health outcomes, and have local impact and regional relevance.

### **EMERGENCY RELIEF PROJECTS**

Designed to provide immediate financial support to Aboriginal communities who require emergency relief funding.
